

### 7. Central amenities

BBQ and picnic tables; toilet block erected in the 1960s, using Carey Gully stone.

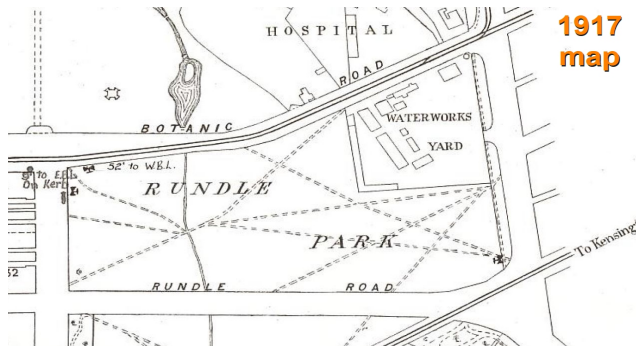
### 8. O'Bahn tunnel access shafts

A covered busway trench, constructed 2016, demolishing dozens of mature trees.



### 9. Peace and Friendship garden

Planted in the early 1980s after closure of former waterworks depot, which was on the site for 105 years.



### 10. Octagonal old pump house – relocated

Moved in 1980s; rebuilt 20 metres further back from the widened intersection.

### 11. Re-vegetation

Massive Aleppo pines, adjacent to Botanic Road; the most striking evidence of J.E. Brown's 1880 re-vegetation plan.

### 12. Fringe Festival

Since 2006, this Park has been best known as the annual Fringe venue: "Garden of Unearthly Delights".

### 13. (back to start) War memorials

Two memorials; to the WWI Australian Light Horse regiment AND their horses. This Park also had extensive air raid shelters during WW2.

## EXPLORE

### Rundle Park / Kadlitpina (Park 13)

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This Trail Guide traverses traditional lands of the Kaurana people. We acknowledge and pay respect to the past, present and future traditional custodians and elders of this land.



**1. Naming**

Kadlitpina was a Kaurna elder at the time of colonisation.

John Rundle was a British MP; one of the founding directors of the speculative South Australian Company, est. 1835.



**2. White cedar "allee"**

The first tree-lined avenue in the Park Lands, planted 1870s. As trees die, they are replaced with the same species.

**3. Pepper trees and Rundle Road**

The road is very wide to facilitate car parking and occasional street events. From 1985 to 1996 it hosted part of Adelaide's former F1 Grand Prix circuit.

**4. Botanic Creek**

Low ground here was often waterlogged until this artificial ephemeral waterway was constructed in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. It flows north (only after rain) into the Botanic Garden lake.

**5. Former wading pool**

Set up in 1961; it was later converted to a now well-used gravel petanque piste.



**6. Lemon-scented gums – concrete birds!**

The largest lemon-scented gum here dates back to the 1860s. In the 1970s, with biodiversity shrinking, this Park hosted concrete birds with push-button bird calls.
